## Mr. "R's" few words ...

Dear Trailblazing Families,

Facebook, MySpace, and tweets have become some of the most common ways for our students to communicate with each other. Over the last couple of weeks, our school has become involved in several disruptive conflicts between students and their families that started on one of these social media sites. The conflicts then spilled over to school. With only two administrators, we certainly have more than enough work to do. Neither Mr. Kurek nor I are hoping to generate more business having to police this outside school activity. At the same time, Mr. Kurek and I feel we have the responsibility to create a campus where all students feel safe from all types of bullying. This includes cyber bullying, the use of threats or inappropriate comments that end up having an impact on our school operations.

Let's look at the conditions governing these sites. Facebook and MySpace require individuals to be only 13 years of age in order to create an account of their own. Twitter limits account holders to those being old enough to enter into any binding contract. Until they change the policies of Facebook and MySpace we should take a good, hard look at the children using these sites. Is your child younger than 13? I know of 9-12 year olds with accounts created by an older sibling. If 13, 14, or 15 years of age, do these youngsters really have the judgment necessary to use these sites wisely? Once your child presses "enter" the communication is permanently available and irretrievable.

Youngsters feel certain anonymity when using these sites. They believe since the conversations take place outside of the school arena that they are beyond the reaches of school discipline. If an incident spills over onto our campus, it may require interviews, parent notification, and/or locker searches. We reserve the right to apply the fundamental guidelines when issuing discipline.

What I find most interesting and very sad is that, in several cases, the parents had no idea that their children even had Facebook accounts. It has been suggested over and over again to place the child's computer in a common area where the sites they are visiting are easily witnessed. In addition, there are a number of pieces of software that will assist parents in seriously monitoring their children's internet use. This type of software can track websites visited, chat rooms visited, email communications and more. Monitoring your child's online activities is not an invasion of privacy. I believe it is your moral responsibility to do so. We, as a school, truly have no interest in limiting or interfering with free speech or activities taking place off campus. However, when they alter our school day, we believe it is our responsibility to maintain control.

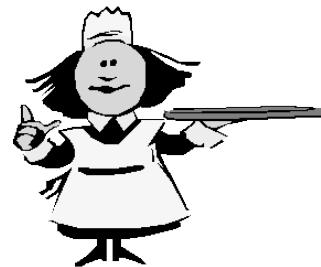


## HEALTH SCREENINGS

On Friday, February 17<sup>th</sup>, all grade 6 students will be screened for scoliosis along with a vision and hearing screening. This is required by Florida statute. Scoliosis affects about 2% of the population. Age 11- 12 is an ideal time to screen for this problem. It is most common in young girls, but boys and adults can have scoliosis, too. We all have curves in our spines, but scoliosis causes the spine to curve in the wrong direction. It causes sideways curves and those are different from the spine's normal curves. It is a simple test, and takes just a minute. All the student needs to do is bend forward so that their back can be observed. If you do not want your child to be screened for scoliosis, vision, and/or hearing, you must provide written notification to the school before the screening day. Again, this must be a written request.

### Non-Fundamental Clothing and Adornments

We are asking parents to revisit the fundamental dress code. It is so much easier to avoid a conflict rather than to alter a dress or top that no longer fits the school standard. How a student leaves their home and how they wear something here at school can be completely different. Students often admit leaving their jacket or sweater (that was supposed to be their cover-up) in their locker during the day, then putting them back on before heading home. Dress code detentions are written based on how the student is wearing the item while here at school.

While most of the rules have clear and understood definitions, clothing and bracelet manufacturers are constantly trying to create something that the students “just have to wear.” Like the “non-fundamental” dictionary, it is not possible to publish a list of words or phrases that are not allowed, as it would be changing continually. Please use the same guidelines published for un-fundamental words on page 10 when selecting clothing with statement imprints or bracelets purporting to support one cause or another.

Regarding the promotional bracelet for a certain body part, the general rule is if the area being advertised is typically covered by clothing, the phrase is not appropriate to be worn here at school. If the phrase describes an activity that is not appropriate for school hours, it is not appropriate to be worn. For example, the American Breast Cancer Society originally sold the bracelets supporting their cause in hopes of raising both funds and awareness to their concern. However, it has now become a novelty item produced by many with no educational benefits or funds donated towards the cause of cancer prevention.

The student planner covers the dress code in great detail (see page 8). Students should dress for “work”, much like someone who works for a fast food chain, grocery store, bank or hospital. If in doubt, just ask!

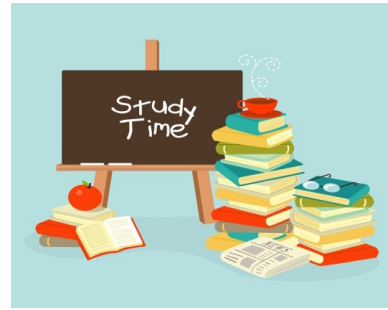
